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International Maritime Organisation: Climate Change Negotiation Mandate

Portfolio Associate Transport

On 2 September 2024, the Cabinet Business Committee:

Background

- noted that New Zealand is participating in International Maritime Organization (IMO) negotiations for the adoption of measures to meet agreed greenhouse gas (GHG) targets for international shipping;
- 2 **noted** that the measures will include an economic emissions pricing mechanism and a technical element (fuel emissions intensity standard);
- noted that the IMO plans for the measures to be finalised in late 2025 with entry into force by 2027;
- 4 **noted** that future IMO GHG regulations will most likely be incorporated into Annex VI of the International Convention for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships (MARPOL) and be binding for New Zealand unless New Zealand reserves its position;
- noted that the negotiations at the IMO will have wider implications for government with potential impacts for trade, New Zealand's economy, its international relationships, and impacts for the region.

Principles for New Zealand's engagement at the IMO



Powers to act

Delegations within bounds of Cabinet guidance

authorised the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Minister for Trade, Associate Minister of Transport, and Minister of Climate Change to take any final decisions on issues in the negotiations;

Delegations outside bounds of Cabinet guidance

- 8 **noted** that, should the negotiations move outside the bounds of existing Cabinet decisions, any final decisions with regards to New Zealand's position would, where possible, be considered by Cabinet;
- 9 **noted** where there are fast-moving developments in the negotiations and time constraints, it may not be possible to convene Cabinet to take final decisions;
- authorised the Prime Minister, Minister for Foreign Affairs, Minister of Finance, Minister for Trade, Associate Minister of Transport, and the Minister of Climate Change to take together any final decisions on other issues in the negotiations, in line with the decisions under CBC-24-MIN-0088;

Next steps

invited the Associate Minister of Transport to report back to the Cabinet Economic Policy Committee on the outcomes of the October IMO negotiations.
