Tāmaki Makaurau Transport Plan

Safety camera detection of mobile phone and seatbelt offences

At the 27 March 2023 officials meeting, you received an update from Waka Kotahi about the safety camera trial to detect mobile phone and seatbelt offences. § 9(2)(f)(iv)

Under the Land Transport Act 1998, safety cameras can only be used to detect "moving vehicle offences". These offences are defined in the Act, and only include speeding, tolling and red-light running offences. The Act does, however, allow other offences to be declared by regulations to be moving vehicle offences.

FIFA Women's World Cup transport readiness

You have asked for an update on the transport sector's readiness for the FIFA Women's World Cup (WWC) Tournament to be co-hosted by Australia and New Zealand in July and August 2023.

Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) is the lead agency for this major event, which we are supporting by facilitating a fortnightly transport forum. Travel arrangements directly in support of the tournament (e.g. teams, officials, FIFA VIPs) are organised directly between FIFA and transport operators; our focus is ensuring the transport system is prepared for the travel needs of supporters and visitors to New Zealand during the tournament. Early estimates indicate over 30,000 overseas tourists will travel to Australia and New Zealand for the tournament. We expect the majority of overseas supporters will be travelling to support the United States of America women's national team, which has been drawn in a New Zealand based group with games in Auckland and Wellington.

The purpose of the transport forum is to ensure all key transport agencies in the sector are connected, have the right information to inform plans relating to the FIFA WWC, and ensure any transport-related emerging issues or risks are captured and mitigated where possible. We also engage with the border and tourism forums where any emerging issues or risks cross over these workstreams.

While we are confident that the transport system is ready and prepared to support the successful delivery of the FIFA WWC Tournament, we have identified two items for MBIE's system risk register:

- 1. Severe weather events. The tournament will take place during winter; for the same period last year over 250 flights were cancelled due to winter storms. However, this was exacerbated as New Zealand was in the tail of the Omicron COVID-19 wave with isolation requirements increasing the number of cancellations of flights. While FIFA have contingency plans in place for weather disruptions to travel of teams and officials, disruptions to regular flight schedules will need to be resolved by airlines using their standard contingency plans.
- 2. Capacity constraints. As you are aware, the tight labour market is affecting transport operators across all modes. While the tournament does not clash with school holidays or the Queenstown Winter Festival, and we expect to see gradual improvements in staffing levels by July 2023, we anticipate there will be isolated delays to a seamless traveller journey across the aviation system, and for public transport on game days due to the volumes of travellers. Waka Kotahi and MBIE are working with the host cities to ensure Regional Public Transport operators are prepared for game days.

The Petition of Claire Dale - Improving Mobility Parking Compliance

On 2 June 2022 we provided you with a briefing [OC220445 refers], informing you that the Ministry had been asked to make a submission on the Petition of Claire Dale. As a reminder, Claire is a mobility parking advocate who you met with in February 2022 to accept her petition about improving mobility parking compliance.

On 10 November 2022, officials attended the Petitions Committee hearing to present our written submission. At the meeting, the Committee agreed that officials from the Ministry, Whaikaha - Ministry for Disabled People, and NZ Police should work together to explore feasible options to address the concerns raised in the Petition.



Cyclone Response and Recovery

The Ministry is working closely with Waka Kotahi and other agencies on our recovery workstreams. The information below updates you on the status of our emergency management arrangements and recovery work.


Emergency Management Arrangements

The Minister for Emergency Management has declared a National Transition Period for the Auckland, Hawkes Bay, Northland, Tairāwhiti, Tararua, and Waikato regions. The declaration means that the National Recovery Manager has the power to direct transport entities (including Waka Kotahi) operating in those regions, for the purposes of the recovery operations.

Recovery work

Briefing on the transport recovery and rebuild

Following your request, we have replaced the draft Cabinet paper with a briefing. The briefing provides an update on planning work to rebuild transport connections impacted by the cyclone. It sets out some principles to inform the recovery phase, and structures to ensure the recovery is well coordinated, including an oversight function within the Ministry. The briefing was provided to your and Minister Allan's Offices on 31 March 2023.

Update following recent International Maritime Organization (IMO) negotiations on a revised strategy to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions from ships

New Zealand officials (from the Ministry, Maritime New Zealand, and Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade) participated virtually in a recent round of negotiations (20-24 March 2023) to develop a revised IMO strategy to reduce GHG emissions from ships. The meeting produced a streamlined draft of the strategy text, which will be used as the basis for the next and final round of negotiations in June 2023.

Divergence on key issues remains. Of most concern is the lack of agreement on the ambition of GHG reduction targets. Negotiators are also struggling to agree on appropriate mid-term measures (including market-based measures). Such measures need to incentivise decarbonisation of the sector and provide for an equitable transition for all, particularly Small Island Developing States (SIDS) and Least Developed Countries (LDCs).

New Zealand's interventions in the negotiations focused on supporting a high ambition zero target by 2050 and supporting a proposal from Pacific states to include a flat rate levy to bridge the price differential between fossil fuels and low/zero carbon alternatives. Should such a levy be implemented, we advocated for the revenue raised to be disbursed in support of an equitable transition, with an emphasis on equity for SIDS and LDCs. § 6(a)

The next step will be an expert workshop in May 2023 to further discuss the mid-term measures, which the New Zealand delegation will join remotely. Following another round of negotiations in June 2023, a final text of the Strategy must be delivered to the IMO's Marine Environment Protection Committee (MEPC) for adoption in July 2023. The New Zealand delegation will attend both the June 2023 negotiations and July 2023 MEPC meeting in person. Depending on the outcome of the expert workshop in May 2023, the New Zealand delegation may require an update to our current negotiating mandate.

Increased media interest in these topics is anticipated leading up to July 2023.

Civil Aviation Authority: Board Evaluation Results

The findings from the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA)'s recent board evaluation show the CAA Board is performing satisfactorily and has a good understanding of its strengths, areas to improve and priorities over the coming year.

In 2021, the Minister of Transport specified the expectation that transport boards undertake an external evaluation every three years, and self performance reviews in other years. CAA Board Chair Janice Fredric has provided the Ministry with a report detailing the findings from a board evaluation facilitated by the Institute of Directors and conducted in September-October 2022.

The board evaluation found the CAA Board's strengths are:

- board culture (mutual respect and trust). Board members and the Chair are all engaged and performing well in their roles.
- performance (organisational, regulatory, and financial),
 especially given recent challenges of significant disruption such as COVID-19
- its constructive relationship with the Chief Executive.

The results also showed the Board is very satisfied with the Chair's performance overall and appreciate her positive relationships with members, the Chief Executive and stakeholders.

The evaluation identified opportunities for the CAA Board to:

- continue refining the focus, quality and volume of information reported to the Board
- continue focusing at a strategic governance level, as opposed to an operational management level
- undertake long-term strategic planning, depending on funding.

We consider these results are positive and will provide a helpful benchmark for the CAA Board's next evaluation. Minister Allan may wish to discuss these findings when she meets with the CAA Board Chair.

Progress update on the Chatham Islands Vessel Replacement and upcoming briefings

We have completed our review of the Chatham Island Vessel Replacement project and are now satisfied that the three conditions of the tagged contingency have been met. These include the ownership of the new vessel, the operating model of the new vessel and the governance arrangements for the purchase of the new vessel.

We are now proposing that \$2.5 million be drawn down from the tagged contingency such that we can start preliminary project work.. This needs to take place before Budget moratorium on 11 April 2023.

These funds will be used to engage project managers and naval architects, and to complete certain engineering work. Future drawdowns of the remaining funds will take place once we have committed to contracts with shipyards for the construction of the vessel.

We are also preparing a briefing for the Minister Allan to consider which Government agency is best placed to continue managing this project. We have been in contact with Waka Kotahi, and initial indications are that they may be best placed to carry this project forward. If this is the case, we will prepare the required briefings and any Cabinet Papers to bring that transfer into effect.







This mandate is centred on New Zealand's mandate in the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) context, ahead of the upcoming, annual UNFCCC Conference of Party (COR). The Ministry has no concerns with the paper nor the consultation document.

Emissions reductions for international aviation and maritime emissions are not a key focus of this mandate, as associated emissions reductions are pursued through the International Civil Aviation Organisation (ICAO) and the International Maritime Organisation (IMO), rather than via the UNFCCC and its annual COP meetings.

In line with this separation, Cabinet mandates for international aviation and maritime negotiations are considered separately to this mandate. Notwithstanding, there is an increased need for this broad international climate change negotiating mandate to align with New Zealand's approach to international climate change negotiations outside the UNFCCC process, such as ICAO and IMO. The Cabinet paper lists this as one of the reasons for proposing Cabinet agree to public consult on the mandate.

By way of context, note that an updated international aviation emissions mandate was agreed by Cabinet ahead of the key climate negotiations at the 2023 41st ICAO Assembly late last year. At this meeting ICAO adopted a long-term global aspirational goal (LTAG) for international aviation of net-zero carbon emissions by 2050 in support of the UNFCCC Paris Agreement's temperature goal.

Legislation passed in 2021 empowers the Governor-General to make regulations concerning certain aspects of the self-identification process, specifically, any additional sex or gender marker besides 'male' or 'female' that may be specified as a nominated sex on a birth certificate. and types of persons that constitute a 'qualified third party for identity verification purposes.

This Cabinet paper seeks authorisation to submit the Births, Deaths, Marriages, and Relationships Registration (Registering Nominated Sex) Regulations 2023 (the Regulations) to the Executive Council.

On 12 December 2022 [CAB-22-MIN-0581 refers], Cabinet agreed on policy decisions to:

- Specify 'another gender' and 'a non-binary gender' as sex and gender markers that can be nominated on a birth certificate, and
- Specify that 'suitably qualified third parties' that can provide a letter of support are:
 - certain professions (registered doctors, registered psychologists, registered psychotherapists, registered nurses, registered social workers, and qualifying counsellors); and
 - a person (aged 18 years or older) who has known the child or young person for 12 months or more.

The Regulations give effect to the policy decisions outlined above and will enable the self-identification process to be fully operational from the time it comes into effect.

The Ministry supports this paper. In the transport context, Waka Kotahi already allows people to write down the specific gender that they identify with when applying for their drivers licence (though for the purposes of the Driver Licence Register, the Register records only male (M), female (F), or gender diverse (X)). We therefore do not anticipate the need to amend transport legislation to align transport-related identification with these changes in the birth certificate space.

EASTER BLOCK OF LINE

Auckland's rail network to close over Easter weekend as major projects progress

The long Easter weekend will see Auckland's entire passenger rail network shut down for essential work, as KiwiRail carries out much-needed maintenance, and progresses our major projects.

Rail work over the long weekend includes three major NZ Upgrade Projects, Wiri to Quay Park/Third Main, Papakura – Pukekohe electrification, and Southern Stations.

KiwiRail and Link Alliance will also be continuing track works at Waitematā (Britomart), Newmarket and Maungawhau/Mount Eden – to support the City Rail Link (CRL),

There will also be further repairs to slip damage that happened on the Western Line, near New Lynn station, in October 2022 and work stabilising a bank near the Newmarket Tunnel, following a slip on 19 March 2023 which disrupted commuter services.

General maintenance, including replacing worn rail and sleepers will take blace, while track maintenance machines – tampers, ballast cleaners and rail grinders – will be operating across the wider network. Most of the work will be done during the day, but some sites will continue into the night.

Maintenance machines may also work both day and night.

KiwiRail will continue running freight services in Auckland during the Easter weekend as we are able.

NORTH ISLAND WEATHER IMPACTS

The rail line to Hastings will reopen on 3 April 2023, allowing freight to be railed to the Hawkes Bay then road-bridged to and from Napier Port.

Remediation work on the line to Napier is ongoing, but due to significant damage to Bridge 217 (next to the Waitangi road bridge) it will take time. Assessments of damage to the line between Napier and Wairoa are ongoing.

Work on the rail line between Auckland and Whangarei are also ongoing. We will provide your office a more detailed update next week.

INTERISLANDER

Repair and service schedule update

The Kaitaki is currently out of service while its gearbox is repaired. Material required for the repair has arrived in New Zealand from Germany and the repair work is underway. We are looking at a return to service date in the week ending 14 April 2023 and we will know more after the weekend. For safety sea trials will be undertaken, and weather conditions could impact the timing of those.

Changes to operating ferry schedules, the fact that we are moving out of peak season, and the reduction in illness due to COVID-19 will all help manage passenger, vehicle, and freight volumes in the weeks ahead.

Weather disruptions update

Continuing bad weather in Cook Strait has resulted in further Interislander cancellations, with southerly gales and heavy seas disrupting sailings since 28 March 2023.

Three return sailings were cancelled, and some sailings were changed to freight only to ensure passenger safety and comfort.

We will continue to monitor the situation closely and expect to make further decisions as forecasts are updated. Affected passengers and freight customers are being contacted and will be transferred to alternative sailings where possible.

We also experienced delays to our services on 23 March 2023, after a suspected chemical leak from a customer's dangerous goods container. The emergency response plan was activated, and the area was cordoned off to ensure no harm until the leak was further investigated and found to be harmless.

Fire and Emergency also responded to the incident. After a thorough check of the container and consultation with the freight customer, it was determined everything was safe and normal operations resumed that morning.

Disruption management update

The latest weather-related disruptions have been managed through our normal processes, and we expect to have cleared this backlog by the end of the weekend. This has not affected our ability to continue to accommodate existing Kaitaki passengers and freight on alternative sailings.

Until Kaitaki returns to service, our priority has been to provide its passengers with as much certainty as possible about their travel. We are now providing more than a week's notice of any change to bookings (outside of any weather-related disruptions) to give people as much time as possible to plan.

We've advised 90 percent of passengers booked on the Kaitaki up till and including Easter Monday, April 10 they've been rebooked on alternative sailings and that no bookings have been cancelled over the long Easter weekend.

A small percentage of passengers booked to travel on Kaitaki prior to Easter, from 1 to 7 April 2023, have had their bookings cancelled. These passengers have been advised to contact the call centre to arrange a refund or to rebook.

In the back office, we have boosted the number of operators in the call centre to 15, from 8 the previous week, in order to deal with the surge of inquiries due to the Kaitaki-related disruptions and to reduce waiting times.

On 3-4 April 2023, we expect to have enough information to announce the date by which Kaitaki will return to service. This will provide certainty for passengers booked after 10 April 2023, including the majority of the school holiday period.

Below is the current timeline for Kaitaki repair and return to service:

- 31 1 March 2023: Shaft bearing and thrust bearings machined and polished in Auckland
- 1 5 April 2023:Bearings transported to Picton and reassembled
- 7 9 April 2023: Reconnect all hydraulics and electrical connections, run trials in berth

10 - 11 April 2023: Sea trials

12 April 2023: Kaitaki back in service

IREX UPDATE

Waitohi Picton construction progresses with major activity now underway focused on:

 Passenger entry switching to Lagoon Road on 3 April 2023. The iReX team is working with Marlborough District Council and Marlborough Roads to enable the switch. Temporary signage will be in place to direct traffic down Kent Street from switch-over day. We are sharing a directional map with passengers, rental companies, Waitohi Picton Information Centre and accommodation providers via Destination Marlborough. We have also

undertaken community engagement and have articles running in Marlborough midweek and Sounds News to inform people of the change.

- The temporary terminal is almost complete and likely to be operational for foot passenger check-in from May.
- Further improvements to Waitohi Awa Culvert and building a replacement mechanical depot on the east side of the terminal
- Construction of two new commercial jetties, just north of the Edwin Fox Museum, and moving the rental kiosks to a new location in the lower car park.

Kaiwharawhara Wellington

- iReX is leading work with Wellington City Council, Let's Get Wellington Moving, CentrePort Wellington, Greater Wellington Regional Council and Waka Kotahi on traffic modelling.
- Marineside investigations have been successfully completed, testing the ocean floor near on Kaiwharawhara Point ahead of construction
- The old arrivals terminal site (no longer in use) is being prepared for demolition and the new passenger vehicle marshalling yard on Kaiwharawhara Point is being prepared for use.

Ships

The makers' selection and drawing review processes are progressing well with 36 percent of drawings and 76 percent of maker proposals now received and design work continuing.





MAJOR PROJECTS UPDATES

Drury Rail Stations

Early earthworks are planned to start in April 2023 at Paerātā Railway Station after an access agreement was reached with a local property owner, to enable early works starting at their property within the designated area for the station. KiwiRail is currently engaged in a process to purchase the property.

A blessing ceremony with the contractor, property owner, Mana Whenua and key local stakeholders will be held to mark the commencement of early works in early April 2023 (date TBC).

Planning application for Ngākōroa Railway Station

Auckland Council have now provided their specialist planning reports for Ngākōroa Railway Station and are recommending the Notices of Requirement be confirmed approved. Council has agreed to refer the planning application to the Environment Court. The Notice of Motion for the Referral is expected to be lodged prior to Easter.

Rolling Stock

Ten new DL mainline locomotives arrived at Port of Tauranga this week to bolster KiwiRail's freight capacity.

This marks another milestone in the Government's Resilient and Reliable rail programme, with the additional DL locomotives ensuring KiwiRail has sufficient reliable rolling stock available to move more of the growing freight task by rail rather than road.

New DL locomotives also emit up to 60% less particulate matter (PM) and up to 30% less NOx than comparable older locomotives in our fleet. We will commission roughly two locomotives per month at our Te Rapa depot and expect to have all ten DLs in service by September 2023, ahead of the next peak freight season.

Auckland Ferries meeting - follow up

We were grateful to be able to participate in your meeting with ferry operators and other stakeholders in Auckland on 23 March 2023.

In follow up to this meeting, we intend to meet with operators, unions and the Maritime Schools to explore whether there are ways to speed up the process of recognising the prior experience of overseas applicants for skilled jobs on the ferries without compromising competency standards. Please let us know if this raises any concerns. We will report back to Minister Allan on the results of these discussions.

In our view, the key issues raised at the meeting with workforce availability are common across the maritime sector (including, as identified in the recent Port Health and Safety Leadership Group report, in Ports). Matters raised in terms of pay, conditions and related contract arrangements for the Auckland ferries exacerbate a set of underlying challenges across the sector that require a similar response to that outlined in the meeting: changes to immigration settings in the shorter term; the development of a concrete plan for New Zealand workforce development in the longer.

Atlas Wind

On 18 March 2023, Vanuatu registered ship, the *Atlas Wind* was detained in Dunedin following an inspection by Maritime NZ.

The inspection found a number of deficiencies to ventilation systems on board the vessel, which we considered as high risk to the safety of those on board.

The Atlas Wind was released from detention on 25 March 2023 after satisfactory repairs.

KiwiRail

On 6 March 2023, KiwiRail notified Maritime NZ of a crack in a ramp on the *Kaiarahi*. We attended the same day to assess the damage and the subsequent repair. The crack has been temporarily repaired with the permanent repair due by its next docking in August 2023.

The *Kaitaki* has been out of operation since 4 March 2023 due to a gearbox fault. The vessel is berthed at Picton due to a lack of capacity at Wellington. KiwiRail are waiting on spare parts for the repair from overseas. There is no firm timeframe for when the vessel will be operational, but the current estimate is the second week of April.
